CALL TO ORDER

Mr. Adam Goetzman, Chair, called the meeting to order at 9:32 a.m. He welcomed everyone to the March ICC meeting.

APPROVAL OF FEBRUARY 6, 2024 ICC MINUTES

Chair Goetzman asked if there were any corrections or amendments to the February 6, 2024 minutes. There were none. Mr. Tom Voss moved to approve the February 6, 2024 minutes. Mr. Steve Anderson seconded the motion, motion carried.

FEBRUARY EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ACTIONS

Chair Goetzman stated the February Executive Committee meeting minutes are for information only.

TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROGRESS REPORTS

Chair Goetzman asked the committee members to review the monthly progress report for February. There being no comments, the progress report for the Transportation Department was accepted.

US EPA Climate Pollution Reduction Grant Program (CPRG) Update

Mr. Travis Miller, OKI staff reminded members that OKI is in Phase 2 of the program with the implementation funding grant due April 1st. The awarded grants can be between \$2million and \$500million. The purpose is to develop and implement locally driven actions that reduce Green House Gas emissions. He reminded members that on March 1st, a Priority Climate Action Plan was submitted. He highlighted GHG Inventory which showed that 70% of the region's emissions are produced in three counties: Hamilton, Butler, and Boone. The region's top emissions are industrial (35%), followed by transportation emissions (30%). He further elaborated the engagement process, which includes a 70+ member steering committee who generated over 100 project ideas (to reduce GHG emissions).

Next, he provided a summary of the grant proposals' six 'pillars' to help reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the 16-county OK-KY-IN MSA. The pillars, with examples are:

- 1. Residential Household Energy Reduction Program such as weatherization, efficient appliances/HVAC
- 2. Local Govt. Public Building Reduction solar and LED light conversion
- 3. Industrial Equipment Replacement Program stationary equipment, mobile equipment
- 4. Transit Service Enhancement targeted zone free fare, fleet replacement expansion
- 5. Landfill Stream Reduction curb side recycling, regional organics facilities, food reuse refrigeration
- 6. Afforestation Tree for Me distributions, 30,000 trees to 60 communities

Mr. Miller reminded members that OKI is the grant administrator and next steps are to finalize program details and grant components along with program budgets.

2050 METROPOLITAN PLAN UPDATE

Dr. Margaret Minzner, OKI staff provided an update of the environmental consultations for the 2024 update to the 2050 Plan. She explained the consultations are prepared because transportation and related development can adversely affect environmental and historic resources. She noted a survey on environmental concerns was completed along with a workshop discussing survey results with the opportunity of environmental experts to weigh in. Additionally, they hosted an engineer's workshop to learn more about the feasibility of mitigation measures from their perspective. All data will be compiled on the Greenspace webpage and incorporated in the Plan update.

OKI CARBON REDUCTION PROGRAM-EV CHARGING INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECT SELECTION (2024 ROUND 1)

Mr. Andy Reser, OKI staff reminded members these awards are for the installation of publicly accessible EV charging infrastructure. The focus is on DC Fast Charging equipment in high density residential and/or employment with adequate demonstrated dwell times and along with the commitment to operate and maintain electric vehicle service equipment for five years. He shared that Ohio has \$13 million available, received 8 applications, requesting \$375k. He noted that Ohio Toll Revenue Credits can be used as the non-federal share, for this round, this saves \$138k in match. There will be a Round 2 of projects in Ohio

due to funds remaining. He then shared that Kentucky has \$3 million available, received 6 applications requesting \$2.8 million.

Chair Goetzman requested a motion to approve Resolution 2024-06, which was provided by Mr. Corey Wright. Ms. Andrea Henderson seconded the motion, motion carried.

FY24-27 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM/ADMINISTRATIVE MODIFICATION #8

Mr. Andy Reser, OKI Staff, said TIP Administrative Modification #8 includes minor funding changes to 24 highway projects and 18 transit projects. In Clermont County, ODOT is adding a study to upgrade preemption equipment at the Indiana and Ohio railroad crossing in Loveland. They are also investigating how that can be interconnected with the OKI funded new pedestrian signal at the Little Miami Scenic Trail. In Hamilton County, Wasson Way Phase 7 construction is being delayed from FY24 to FY26 to allow time to reroute the path on a different alignment. In Boone County, they requested moving SNK funds between phases for both KY 20 turn lanes and Conner Road multi-use path. In Kenton County, the City of Erlanger requested additional funds to be moved to State Forces to allow KYTC to do environmental

overview of the project. Lastly, in Indiana, INDOT requested funding modifications for nine projects and adding three INDOT projects to an existing Grouped Project for maintenance and repair. Mr. Reser stated that on the transit side, the Modification changes funding types, years, and funding amounts for 3 BCRTA projects, 9 SORTA projects and 6 TANK projects.

Chair Goetzman requested a motion to approve TIP Administrative Modification #8. Mr. Scott Tadych moved to approve, and Mr. Steve Anderson seconded the motion, motion carried.

FY24-27 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM/AMENDMENT #6A

OKI staff, Mr. Andy Reser stated that TIP Amendment 6 has been split into 6A and 6B. He shared this is done sometimes to separate the exempt and non-exempt projects because an Amendment with a non-exempt project is subject to air quality conformity and gets bumped to FHWA and FTA to review and that review can take an additional 4-6 weeks before the Amendment can be added to the STP.

He shared that Amendment 6A includes the addition of 17 highway projects that are all exempt from air quality conformity; 14 of these projects come from last year's Prioritization Process that were awarded OKI STBG/CMAQ or TA Funds in October 2023. The new projects are Butler County MetroParks for the new portion of the Great Miami River Trail, Butler County TID North Hamilton Crossing Phase 1, City of Fairfield's extension of the Miami River Trail and the Pleasant Avenue Multi-Use Path.

In Hamilton County, City of Springfield Northland Blvd and Kemper Road realignment, City of Loveland's Loveland-Madeira Road, Cincinnati Lick Run Connector multi-use paths and Reading and Azmann sidewalk and Colerain Springdale Road sidewalks. In Warren County, City of Mason signals and Warren County TID SR63 improvements. In Campbell County, City of Alexandria East Main Street sidewalk. In Kenton County, Crestview Hills Horsebranch Road, and Park Hills Amsterdam Road. OKI funded projects for transit include new battery electric buses for SORTA, BRT and TANK hybrid-electric buses.

Non-OKI projects in this amendment are a new structure demolition project for the Wester Hills Viaduct and a 2023 Federal RAISE grant to Bellevue and Southbank Partners for use on planning and designing of Riverfront Commons. Other transit projects are also added for BCRTA, Clermont County, SORTA and TANK. He noted that the Amendment was sent to the Interagency Consultation Group for review and posted on oki.org since February 28th. No adverse comments were received.

Chair Goetzman requested a motion for approval of Resolution 2024-07, which was provided by Mr. Steve Anderson with a second from Mr. Corey Wright; motion passed.

FY24-27 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM/AMENDMENT #6B

Mr. Andy Reser, OKI staff stated that Amendment 6B includes one non-exempt highway project, PID 114606, the Fields Ertel Road widening project between Snider and Wilkens. Hamilton and Warren County requested 10% additional OKI STBG funds, and the local funding amount is also increasing. He stated it is about a \$5million increase over the previous estimate and they hope to go to bid soon. The Amendment, as well as OKI's short conformity report based on a previous regional emissions analysis were sent to the Interagency Consultation Group for review. The Amendment was posted to oki.org with no adverse comments received.

Chair Goetzman requested a motion for approval of Resolution 2024-08. Mr. Scott Tadych provided a motion with a second from Mr. Steve Anderson; motion passed.

Chair Goetzman reminded members there is a Project Funding & Prioritization Workshop after today's ICC meeting.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ACTIONS

Executive Committee Meeting Minutes Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments March 14, 2024 – 10:30 a.m.

Attendance record for OKI board members along with guests and staff follows the minutes.

Item #1A - Administrative

OKI Board President Gary Moore called the meeting to order at 10:34 a.m. He reminded everyone to sign in, silence cell phones and to state your name clearly when making a motion, second or comment. He also noted that since this is an executive committee meeting, only those committee members or their alternates may make a motion, second or vote. Trustee Michael Logue led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Item #1B - Approval of the February 8, 2024 Executive Committee meeting minutes

President Moore requested approval of the February 8th Executive Committee meeting minutes as distributed. Mr. Ken Reed, Treasurer moved that the minutes be approved as presented with a second from Commissioner T.C. Rogers; motion passed unanimously.

Item #1C - CEO's Report

Mr. Mark Policinski began his remarks by sharing the sudden news of Red Bike's announcement it was shutting down operations. In the announcement, Red Bank executives have mentioned the possibility of selling its assets. OKI has invested \$3.6million for this mode of transportation. He noted that Red Bike cannot sell those assets without negotiation with the federal government's agent, in this case ODOT. ODOT would be paid back for some of OKI's investment. He mentioned that Councilman Mark Jeffreys along with others are trying to find a solution that keeps Red Bike operating. Mr. Policinski said that he wished them well and OKI is glad to provide data and support. He also noted that future funding of Red Bike will be up to the OKI Board of Directors. He wanted to assure the Board that their investments have legal protection and will make that known to the operators of Red Bike.

He next mentioned that the Board will be hearing from the independent auditor, Mr. Kyle Dougherty, on OKI's FY 2023 audit. He noted that OKI remains in sound fiscal stature and are good shepherds of the taxpayer's money. He next complimented OKI's finance staff in meeting every financial and accounting test of OKI's fiscal operations. Having federal, state, and local dollars from three distinct states is a remarkable challenge. He asked the finance staff to stand and be recognized for their hard work in meeting the various layers of government accounting.

Mr. Policinski concluded his remarks focusing on the Martin Luther King interchange in Uptown. He shared that in 2013, the OKI Board made a revolutionary investment on an interchange that has regional impacts. Such as:

- The Uptown area is the region's second largest employment center outside of downtown Cincinnati. Of the 55,000 jobs, twenty thousand were held by persons from outside of Hamilton County
- Tens of thousands of students from the region and beyond attend University of Cincinnati
- A large majority of patients in Uptown's hospitals are from outside the city of Cincinnati

OKI helped craft a radical funding scheme to build the interchange projects on a historically fast schedule. OKI's BOD agreed to take on a payment of \$25million loan to the city from the Ohio State Infrastructure Bank. The solution was innovative for several reasons: the loan size was up to 250 times the size of a normal SIB loan. No other MPO had even been responsible for such a massive SIB loan and lastly, the Board ensured paying the loan over 25 years at a payment of \$1million per year for decades from OKI funds.

He thanked the Board for their visionary solution in 2013 and was proud to share that the loan will be paid off in July of 2024, fifteen years early due to the hard work of our partners at ODOT and the City of Cincinnati, the actual loan amount was less and because the Board year after year voted to honor the \$1million commitment. He said he has been told that the investment in Uptown over the past decade is over \$1billion, all related to investment of the interchange.

<u>Item #1D - Finance Officer's Report</u>

Director of Finance, Ms. Katie Hannum, stated copies of the Finance Officer's Report were distributed to all in advance with a printed copy at their seats. Ms. Hannum reported the Council's financing activities, as of March 14, 2024, OKI had:

\$487,053 in the PNC Bank Commercial Checking Account \$26,626 in the PNC HSA/FSA Checking Account \$668,631 in the STAR Ohio Money Market Mutual Fund Account

Ms. Hannum reported there has been no recent activity on OKI's line of credit, and that there is no outstanding balance at report date. She further reported on Balance Sheet, Revenue and Expense information.

President Moore requested a motion to approve the financial report. Commissioner David Painter provided a motion, Councilmember Mark Jeffreys seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

He noted that Ohio Toll Revenue Credits can be used as the non-federal share, for this round, this saves \$138k in match. There will be a Round 2 of projects in Ohio due to funds remaining (applications due June 7th). Mr. Reser then shared that Kentucky has \$3 million available, received 6 applications requesting a total of \$2.8 million. President Moore requested a motion to approve OKI Resolution 2024-06, which was provided by Commissioner Steve Hayden. Judge Knochelmann seconded the motion; motion passed unanimously.

Item #4 - Environmental Consultation for the Update to OKI's 2050 Plan

Dr. Margaret Minzner, OKI staff provided an update of the environmental consultations for the 2024 update to the 2050 Plan. She explained the consultations are prepared because transportation and related development can adversely affect environmental and historic resources. She noted a survey on environmental concerns was completed along with a workshop discussing survey results with the opportunity of environmental experts to weigh in.

Additionally, they hosted an engineer's workshop to learn more about the feasibility of mitigation measures from their perspective. All data will be compiled on the Greenspace webpage and incorporated in the Plan update.

<u>Item #5 - Presentation of Fiscal Year 2023 Audit Report via Teams</u>

Mr. Kyle Dougherty, partner-in-charge at Zupka & Associates provided an overview of OKI's annual audit report for fiscal year 2023. He stated there were no deficiencies, no issues of internal controls and assured members of the solid financial standing of the agency.

President Moore requested a motion to accept and file the auditor's report. A motion was provided by Mr. Ken Reed with a second from Commissioner Painter; motion passed unanimously.

<u>Item #6 - Intermodal Coordinating Committee Report</u>

OKI staff, Mr. Andy Reser provided a brief update on the ICC meeting held on March 12, 2024. He noted the Committee heard about the following topics, Climate Pollution Reduction Grant Program Update and a 2050 Plan Environmental Consultations. The Committee recommended three Resolution for executive committee approval, the Carbon Reduction Program EV Vehicle Charging Projects as well as TIP Amendments #6A and #6B. He last shared there was a workshop held after ICC meeting to discuss the upcoming round of transportation funding opportunities.

<u>Item #7 - Amendment #6A of the OKI Fiscal Years 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program</u>

OKI staff, Mr. Andy Reser stated that TIP Amendment 6 has been split into 6A and 6B. He shared this is done sometimes to separate the exempt and non-exempt projects because an Amendment with a non-exempt project is subject to air quality conformity and gets bumped to FHWA and FTA to review and that review can take an additional 4-6 weeks before the Amendment can be added to the STP.

He stated that Amendment 6A includes the addition of 17 highway projects that are all exempt from air quality conformity; 14 of these projects come from last year's Prioritization Process that were awarded OKI STBG/CMAQ or TA Funds in October 2023. The new projects are Butler County MetroParks for the new portion of the Great Miami River Trail, Butler County TID North Hamilton Crossing Phase 1, City of Fairfield's extension of the Miami River Trail and the Pleasant Avenue Multi-Use Path.

In Hamilton County, City of Springfield Northland Blvd and Kemper Road realignment, City of Loveland's Loveland-Madeira Road, Cincinnati Lick Run Connector multi-use paths and Reading and Azmann sidewalk and Colerain Springdale Road sidewalks. In Warren County, City of Mason signals and Warren County TID SR63 improvements. In Campbell County, City of Alexandria East Main Street sidewalk. In Kenton County, Crestview Hills Horsebranch Road, and Park Hills Amsterdam Road. OKI funded projects for transit include new battery electric buses for SORTA, BRT and TANK hybrid-electric buses.

Non-OKI projects in this amendment are a new structure demolition project for the Wester Hills Viaduct and a 2023 Federal RAISE grant to Bellevue and Southbank Partners for use on planning and designing of Riverfront Commons. Other transit projects are also added for BCRTA, Clermont County, SORTA and TANK. He noted that the Amendment was sent to the Interagency Consultation Group for review and posted on oki.org since February 28th. No adverse comments were received.

President Moore requested a motion to approve OKI Resolution 2024-07. A motion was provided by Judge Executive Knochelmann with a second from Trustee Michael Logue; motion passed unanimously.

<u>Item #8 - Amendment #6B of the OKI Fiscal Years 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program</u>

Mr. Andy Reser, OKI staff stated that Amendment 6B includes one non-exempt highway project, PID 114606, the Fields Ertel Road widening project between Snider and Wilkens. Hamilton and Warren County requested 10% additional OKI STBG funds, and the local funding amount is also increasing. He stated it is about a \$5million increase over the previous estimate and they hope to go to bid soon. The Amendment, as well as OKI's short conformity report based on a previous regional emissions analysis were sent to the Interagency Consultation Group for review. The Amendment was posted to oki.org with no adverse comments received.

President Moore requested a motion to approve OKI Resolution 2024-08. A motion was provided by Commissioner T.C. Rogers with a second from Mr. Roger Kerlin; motion passed unanimously.

Item #9 - Other Business

President Moore reminded everyone the next meeting is April 11, a Board of Director's meeting starting at 10:30 a.m.

He also stressed the need to make decisions that will not negatively impact the Clifton Street Redesign and noted that even though the impact of Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) through the community is relatively unknown at this time separate decisions regarding BRT should also be made. Much input was received from residents including the need for enforcement of penalties for bad/poor driving behavior, acknowledgement of individuals in wheelchairs and the use of temporary materials or actions as a test run before installing permanent solutions. There was a consensus that the reduction of speed must be addressed first before considering bike lanes and that there needs to be specific discussion regarding Clifton Avenue because the street is comprised of a number of different lanes and lane widths.

Cincinnati Accessibility Board of Advisors (CABA) Monthly Meeting — March 21, 2024-CABA Chairperson reported the city of Cincinnati will be installing audible signals announcing "Walk" or "Wait" for all crosswalks at major intersections. A representative from the city Department of Buildings and Inspections made a presentation to explain the steps required for making buildings accessible and highlighted how those steps apply to buildings classified as either historic or non-historic buildings.

Hamilton County Administration – March 25, 2024-Disseminated information from Hamilton County announcing an Apprenticeship Accelerator workshop on how to establish and register apprenticeship programs with the state of Ohio to area community council presidents for distribution to their respective constituents.

Center for Independent Living Options (CILO) – March 26, 2024-Distributed the center's March 2024 issue of its e-newsletter to TTEOT members.

U.C. Social Justice Department – U.C. Speaker Series – March 28, 2024-Participated in the department's panel discussion on "Serving the Public with Information".

Community Council Meetings – March 4, 7, 18, 20 and 25, 2024: Staff attended the monthly community council meeting in Bond Hill on March 7th, in Northside on March 18th and in Mt Washington on March 20th to monitor any on-going transportation concerns or issues.

At the Clifton Town Meeting on March 4th during the course of reporting fire runs in the community for the month, a representative from Clifton Fire Station #34 urged residents and visitors to obey the street signs around the fire station. Located at Clifton and Ludlow Avenues, the fireman explained that the parking of some residents and visitors in the community is making it difficult for the fire engines to get in and out of the firehouse. The community council president reported that the city of Cincinnati's Department of Transportation and Engineering is preparing to draft plans for a redesign of Clifton Avenue from Ludlow to Lafayette and will be seeking input from the community to make Clifton Avenue safer for pedestrians, cyclists, and motorists.

At the Over-the-Rhine Community Council meeting on March 25th attendees were asked to complete a parking survey for north of Liberty Street. There was extensive input from attendees who expressed concerns that surveys and discussions regarding parking don't benefit the residents but are for the benefit of the business community. Residents complained of paying for a residential parking permit but finding no parking spaces and finding no enforcement of violators. It was suggested there be dialogue between the city of Cincinnati and owners of the parking lots and parking garages in the community that are vacant after business hours and during the weekend.

The staff and the consultant have requested and compiled transit ridership data from February 2024 for the purpose of OD data expansion. Data expansion will start as soon as the processed OD data becomes available, which is anticipated to be in early April.

The consultant has completed the processing of the recorded on-to-off counts on selected SORTA routes and has delivered the data to OKI. The staff is currently engaged in data review and QAQC.

Commuter Assistance Services (667.1)

Staff continued to process and update applications for the month of March.

Staff posted to social media about vanpools.

Rideshare radio ads ended on March 31.

Staff attended Ohio Commuter Challenge Committee meeting.

Section 5310 Program (674.3)

The 5310 Oversight Team met on March 22 to review and score the 5310 applications.

Staff reviewed invoices for awarded projects. Staff received sub<u>re</u>cipient monitoring questionnaires and vehicle monitoring reports along with agency's audits and Title VI Plans. Staff will review all the information and will follow up with subrecipients as needed.

Ohio Exclusive: Transportation Planning Activities (684.3)

Classified traffic counts and vehicle occupancy counts at select Ohio locations - The OKI Board approved the selection of DLZ National for the traffic data collection contract. Field work continues. Data collection for bike/ped counts was completed. Same for vehicle occupancy. Volume count collection was 35% completed as of the end March. The remaining volume locations will be completed during Spring 2024. Spring season started early February 2024. Due to weather and software issues, there was a delay in data retrieving and equipment deployment.

Fully functioning next generation ORBCS count station(s) at one Ohio River bridge location – Staff is in the process of developing an RFP for an AI camera-based count station in the vicinity of the Combs-Hehl bridge.

Access to observed travel data through financial participation in ODOT's travel data purchase – OKI was granted access to the Streetlight platform for all OKI counties without cost to the agency from ODOT.

The consultant has completed the initial review of almost 7,000 stormwater basins. Staff met with Strand associates on March 19th to review the initial findings. Of the nearly 7K basins over 2900 were identified as dry basins. Those basins were then evaluated for storage capacity with 159 having a storage capacity of 4 acre-feet or greater. The next phase of analysis will examine these more closely. Staff also prepared and delivered GIS parcel data and impervious surface data to Strand.

Housing Dashboard and Workshop – Work continues on the Housing Dashboard project. Staff gathered and refined parcel level data by county and existing housing type.

DESCRIPTION: Each year OKI is required to affirm that the regional transportation

planning process is being carried out in conformance with all

applicable federal regulations.

BACKGROUND: Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs) must remain certified

in order to be able to continue to receive federal funding to conduct the necessary regional transportation planning called for as part of the Federal-Aid Transportation Program. This activity is what maintains the region's eligibility for federal funding assistance for highway and transit projects. The planning process is governed by many federal regulations, and each year the OKI Board of Directors is asked to endorse staff's affirmation that OKI efforts satisfy all such requirements. In addition, every fourth year representatives from the applicable federal agencies must conduct an on-site, in-depth review of the MPO's adherence to all statutory and regulatory requirements. In November 2020 such a review concluded that OKI was meeting or exceeding all such requirements of the metropolitan planning regulations as

proscribed in 23 CFR 450.

WHEREAS, the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments (OKI) is designated as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) by the Governors of Ohio, Kentucky and Indiana, acting through the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT), the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet (KYTC) and Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) in cooperation with locally elected officials in the OKI Metropolitan Planning Area (MPA) as evidenced in the Agreement, number 3206, between ODOT and OKI dated July 1, 1979 and the Agreement between KYTC and OKI dated July 1, 1983 encompassing the Counties of Butler, Clermont, Hamilton and Warren in the State of Ohio, and Boone, Campbell and Kenton in the Commonwealth of Kentucky and Dearborn County, Indiana; and

WHEREAS, the federal regulations pertaining to Urban Transportation Planning, published as 23 CFR 450.334, require the MPO, ODOT, KYTC and INDOT to certify that the transportation planning process cooperatively conducted is in conformance with the regulations; and

WHEREAS, the federal regulations also require that the metropolitan transportation planning process be carried out in accordance with all applicable requirements including:

- 1. 23 U.S.C. 134, 49 USC 5303, and 23 CFR Part 450.300;
- 2. Sections 174 and 176 (c) and (d) of the Clean Air Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. 7504, 7506(c) and (d)) and 40 CFR Part 93;
- 3. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended (42 U.S.C. 2000d-1) and 49 CFR Part 21;
- 4. 49 U.S.C. 5332, prohibiting discrimination on the basis of race, color, creed, national origin, sex or age in employment or business opportunity;
- 5. Section 1101(b) of the FAST ACT (Pub. L 114-357) and 49 CFR Part 26 regarding the involvement of disadvantaged business enterprises in US DOT funded projects;
- 6. 23 CFR Part 230, regarding the implementation of an equal employment opportunity program on Federal and Federal-aid highway construction contracts;
- 7. The provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. 12101 et seq.) and 49 CFR Parts 27, 37, and 38;
- 8. The Older Americans Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. 6101), prohibiting the discrimination on the basis of age in program and activities receiving Federal financial assistance;
- 9. Section 324 of title 23 U.S.C. regarding the prohibition of discrimination based on gender; and
- 10. Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794) and 49 CFR Part 27 regarding discrimination against individuals with disabilities.

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Transportation conducted a certification review of the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments in November 2020, and issued a subsequent finding, including ten commendations, that the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments was fully certified as meeting all pertinent requirements: Now, therefore,

Staff presents the amendment to the Intermodal Coordinating Committee (ICC), the ICC considers the issue, and makes a recommendation to the Board of Directors. Any public comments will be presented to the Executive Committee

prior to scheduled action.

associated funding amount and source specified. Staff has determined that there is adequate funding available, or anticipated to be available, and the funding amounts are shown in year of

WHEREAS, the amendment is consistent with the *OKI 2050 Metropolitan Transportation Plan* as amended on September 14, 2023 and the OKI Regional ITS Architecture adopted on September 8, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the Cincinnati ozone maintenance area consists of the Ohio counties of Butler, Clermont, Hamilton and Warren, the Kentucky counties of Boone, Campbell and Kenton, and a portion of the Indiana county of Dearborn; and OKI's Transportation Plan and TIP are subject to transportation conformity rules; and

WHEREAS, Amendment 7 – Fiscal Years 2024-2027 Transportation Improvement Program includes one project subject to transportation conformity requirements and the project has been previously analyzed, and the conformity determination is relying on a previous regional emissions, and OKI has engaged in interagency consultation with federal, state and local partners, including the U.S. Department of Transportation, and those partners have concurred with the methodology used by OKI to determine conformity; and

WHEREAS, the amended OKI FY 2024-2027 TIP conforms with all applicable U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) approved State Implementation Plans for air quality; and

WHEREAS, the opportunity for public participation has been provided per OKI's Public Participation Plan; and

WHEREAS, the environmental justice impacts of these amendments have been considered with "Executive Order 12898 Federal Actions to Address Environmental Justice in Minority Populations and Low Income Populations"; and

WHEREAS, this amendment will result in a TIP that remains fiscally constrained: Now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Directors of the Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments at its regular public meeting on April 11, 2024 hereby amends the Fiscal Years 2024 – 2027 Transportation Improvement Program as shown in the attached Amendment #7 project table:
