CALL TO ORDER

Mr. Adam Goetzman, Chair called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m. He welcomed everyone to the May ICC meeting.

APPROVAL OF APRIL 8, 2025 ICC MINUTES

Mr. Adam Goetzman, Chair asked if there were any corrections or amendments to the April 8, 2025 minutes. There being no changes. Mr. Wilson moved to approve April 8, 2025 minutes. Mr. Long seconded the motion, motion carried.

APRIL BOARD OF DIRECTORS ACTIONS

Mr. Adam Goetzman, Chair said the April Board of Directors meeting minutes are for information only.

TRANSPORTATION PLANNING PROGRESS REPORT

Mr. Adam Goetzman, Chair asked the committee members to review the monthly progress report for April. There being no comments, the progress report for the Transportation Department was accepted.

RIVERFRONT COMMONS AND THE 20-MILE RIVERWALK PROJECT

Mr. Will Weber, President and CEO Southbank Partners, gave an over on Riverfront Commons and the 20-mile Riverwalk project. He mentioned this was to promote and coordinate economic development for the creation of connected communities, vibrant riverfronts, and resilient downtowns; by facilitating

collaboration, bringing vision to reality, and providing a unified voice to represent the common needs and interests of the partnering cities.

SECTION 5310 FEDERAL FUNDS ALLOCATED TO THE CINCINNATI URBAN AREA

Ms. Summer Jones, OKI Staff reported OKI's 5310 program, administered by the Federal Transit Administration (FTA), is an annual program that provides funding to improve transportation services for older adults and those with disabilities.

This year's recipients: BAWAC Inc. (\$151,244), Cincinnati Association for the Blind and Visually Impaired (\$340,777), Clermont Senior Services (\$293,540), Council on Aging of Southwestern Ohio (\$498,976), Easterseals Redwood (\$163,825), Oxford Seniors (\$124,839), The Point/Arc of Northern Kentucky (\$67,476), University of Cincinnati Impact Innovation (\$71,607), Volunteers of America (\$41,883), Warren County Community Services (\$116,872), and Wesley Community Services (\$136,290).

Mr. Wilson moved to recommend to the Executive Committee Approval of Resolution 2025-17 Concerning Selection of Projects to be Funded with Section 5310 Federal Funds Allocated to the Cincinnati Urban Area. Mr. Long seconded the motion, motion carried.

NON-MOTORIZED COUNT PROGRAM

Ms. Elizabeth Niese, Ph.D., OKI Staff reported the purpose of this resolution is to authorize OKI's CEO to accept \$124,000 in funding from the Ohio Department of Transportation and amend the FY2025 Unified Planning Work Program to implement a bicycle/pedestrian counter pilot program and enter into an agreement for professional services to install this equipment. OKI aims to collect vital usage data that will enhance transportation planning efforts and support evidence-based decision-making for future bike and pedestrian infrastructure investments throughout the Ohio portion of the OKI region.

Mr. Wilson moved to recommend to the Executive Committee approval of Resolution 2025-19 Authorizing the Acceptance of Funds from the Ohio Department of Transportation for a Bicycle/Pedestrian Counter Pilot Program. Mr. Johnston seconded the motion, motion carried.

REGIONAL CLEAN AIR PROGRAM MARKETING CAMPAIGN

Ms. Jenny Newcomb, OKI Staff reported that Resolution 2025-20 is to establish authorization for the marketing expenditures for the FY2026 clean air campaign. OKI's clean air campaign is an outreach program in the OKI region, educating businesses and citizens about air quality issues and steps that can be taken to reduce pollution. The expenses are approved as eligible expenses by the Federal Highway

Administration, Ohio Department of Transportation and the Kentucky Transportation cabinet under current Ohio CMAQ grant cycle and Kentucky SNK.

Mr. Wright moved to recommend to Executive Committee approval of Resolution 2025-20 Approving and Authorizing the Marketing Campaign for the Regional Clean Air Program. Mr. Wilkens seconded the motion, motion carried.

RIDESHARE PROGRAM MARKETING CAMPAIGN

Ms. Jenny Newcomb, OKI Staff said OKI's RideShare program serves as the Local Rideshare Agency (LRA) for OKI's eight-county region and the goal of the program is to reduce single occupant vehicles from the region's congested roadways by providing commuters with alternative forms of transportation such as carpooling and vanpooling. This resolution seeks authorization for the Executive Director to enter into contracts and single commitments exceeding \$30,000 so staff will be able to execute, without delay, contracts and agreements for this valuable program. The RideShare program launched an APP "GOhioCommute"

Mr. Sievers moved to recommend to Executive Committee approval of Resolution 2025-21 Approving and Authorizing the Fiscal Year 2026 Marketing Campaign for the Rideshare Program. Ms. Henderson seconded the motion, motion carried.

FY24-27 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM/ADMINISTRATIVE MODIFICATION #19

Mr. Andy Reser, OKI Staff, presented TIP Administrative Modification #19. Some changes to existing TIP projects are minor and only require an administrative correction to show the change in the TIP. Typically, these minor changes involve a movement of a particular phase of a project from one fiscal year to another, within the four-year planning horizon of the TIP, or a minor change in the funding amount. The Modification included just one project, PID 6-441 the City of Erlanger Dolwick Connector. This project is from Dolwick Road to Mineola Pike and includes new sidewalks with dedicated bike lanes and retaining walls. The Modification increases the OKI funds available for construction. This amounts to an additional 10% OKI funds, prorated for a past reduction in scope.

Mr. Wilson moved to approve TIP Administrative Modification #19. Ms. Huller seconded the motion, motion carried.

OTHER BUSINESS

Mr. Reser, OKI staff announced the deadline for funding application is June 6, 2025.

Mr. Goetzman, Chair said ICC membership forms are due to Regina Fields by Monday, May 19.

Mr. Goetzman, Chair announced a Stakeholder workshop for Access Ohio 2050 will be held tomorrow at OKI offices and a flyer is available on the back table with more information if interested.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE ACTIONS

May 8, 2025 – 10:30 a.m. Executive Committee Meeting Minutes Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments

Attendance record for OKI board members along with guests and staff follows the minutes.

Item #1A Administrative

First Vice President Bonnie Batchler called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. She reminded everyone to sign in, silence cell phones and to state your name/member name clearly when making a motion, second or comment. Trustee Tom Peck, Clermont County Township Association led the Pledge of Allegiance.

First Vice President Batchler requested a moment of silence to honor fallen Veteran and retired Hamilton County Sheriff's Officer, Deputy Larry Henderson.

Item #1B Approval of April 10, 2025, Board of Directors meeting minutes

First Vice President Batchler requested approval of the April 10 Board of Directors meeting minutes as distributed. Resident member, Mr. Karl Schultz provided a motion with a second from Council member Susan Vaughn, City of Hamilton; motion passed.

Item #1C CEO's Report

OKI CEO Mark Policinski shared at the June board of directors meeting, members will be voting on the agency's FY2026 budget and FHWA (Federal Highway Administration) will present findings of its certification of OKI.

Mr. Policinski provided an update of the Transportation bill. He noted current legislation ends in December 2026 and the reauthorization process is working its way through Congress. He said that NARC (National Association of Regional Councils) has been diligently making the case for MPO's (Metropolitan Planning Organizations) for when they get in front of respective committee members. He noted that OKI's legislative and communications manager, Julia Brossart will provide future transportation bill updates to the board.

Mr. Policinski closed by remarking on the incredible career of OKI board member Mr. Darryl Haley who is retiring from Metro at the end of May. He noted that Mr. Haley initiated and brought to fruition large-scale changes during his five years as CEO. Mr. Policinski noted that Mr. Haley is one of the most accomplished CEO's, whose great vision transformed Metro's operation to benefit its riders for years to come.

Item #1D Finance Officer's Report

Director Hannum stated copies of the Finance Officer's Report were distributed in advance with a printed copy at members' seats. She reported on the Council's financing activities, as of May 8, 2025, OKI had:

\$586,061 - PNC Bank Commercial Checking Account\$6,579 - PNC HSA/FSA Checking Account\$1,020,538 - STAR Ohio Money Market Mutual Fund Account

Director Hannum reported there has been no recent activity on OKI's line of credit, and that there is no outstanding balance at report date. She further reported on Balance Sheet, Revenue and Expense information.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion to approve the financial report. Resident member & Treasurer, Mr. Ken Reed provided a motion with a second from Trustee Tom Peck, Clermont County Township Association; motion passed.

Item #2 America's River Roots Festival

Ms. Susan Fisher, executive director shared general details about the festival which will be on both sides of the Ohio River in early October. She said there will be live music, riverboat cruises, food, and cultural events in celebration of America's 250th anniversary.

Item #3 Selection of Projects to be Funded with Section 5310 Federal Funds Allocated to the Cincinnati Urban Area

OKI staff, Summer Jones shared the funding from the 5310-grant help serves the mobility needs of the elderly and disabled. She noted the members of the oversight committee were exemplary in how they worked together to try and figure out how to fund the most programs since the need is so great.

Members of the oversight committee are:

The oversight team scored and awarded 11 applications totaling a little over \$2 million.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI Resolution 2025-17. A motion was provided by Judge Executive Kris Knochelmann, Kenton County with a second from Vice Mayor Julie Smith-Morrow, City of Newport.

Item #4 Resolution Authorizing Retaining 4BIS.com as Managed Service Provider for Information Technology Infrastructure

OKI staff, David Shuey shared that OKI utilizes a managed service provider to maintain and secure the computer network. The current provider, 4BIS.com's expertise and cost-effectiveness lead the agency to recommend them for FY2026. The resolution allows the CEO to execute a contract with 4BIS.com that does not exceed \$116,000.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI Resolution 2025-18. Trustee Shannon Hartkemeyer, Butler County Association of Township Trustees & Clerks provided a motion with a second from Council member Susan Vaughn, City of Hamilton; motion passed.

Item #5 Non-Motorized Count Program

OKI staff, Dr. Elizabeth Niese shared that OKI is a recipient of an ODOT award (\$124,000) to implement a bicycle/pedestrian counter program at 12 sites (sites TBD in Ohio). The resolution authorizes OKI's CEO to accept funding to purchase the count equipment and enter into an agreement with a consultant to install the equipment. The data collected will aid in planning efforts, safety analysis and bike/ped infrastructure investments. The data will be shared with ODOT and partners.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI Resolution 2025-19. Mayor Elizabeth Slamka, City of Middletown provided a motion with a second from Trustee Tom Peck, Clermont County Township Association; motion passed.

Item #6 Resolution Authorizing the Marketing Campaign for the Regional Clean Air Program

OKI staff, Jenny Newcomb stated that OKI is the eligible grant recipient for federal assistance in promoting the region's clean air program. The resolution authorizes the marketing/advertising expenditures for the FY2026 Clean Air Program. She shared the Clean Air Program is currently promoted with radio ads and during Cincinnati Reds games.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI 2025-20 which was provided by Trustee Jonathan Sams, Warren County Association of Township Trustees & Clerks with a second from Commissioner David Painter, Clermont County; motion carried.

Item #7 Resolution Authorizing the Marketing Campaign for the Regional RideShare Program

OKI staff, Jenny Newcomb shared that OKI's RideShare program serves as the local rideshare agency for OKI's eight-county region. The goal of the program is to reduce single occupant vehicles on the roadways. The purpose of the resolution is to authorize the marketing expenditures for the FY2026 RideShare campaign.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI 2025-21. Commissioner Stephanie Summerow Dumas, Hamilton County provided a motion with a second from Mr. Darryl Haley, Metro; motion carried.

Item #8 – Intermodal Coordinating Committee Report

OKI staff, Mr. Andy Reser provided a brief update of the ICC meeting held on April 8, 2025. He shared the ICC committee heard a presentation of the Riverfront Commons project in northern Kentucky from OKI board member Will Weber, Southbank Partners. Mr. Weber shared that approximately 5 miles of the riverwalk is complete and future plans include 20 miles of trail from Ludlow to Silver Grove. OKI awarded approximately \$8.5 million for several phases of the project.

Mr. Reser also noted that the ICC committee approved a TIP Administrative Modification and recommended resolutions on 5310 federal funds program, OKI's Non-Motorized Count program, Regional Clean Air program and RideShare program. He lastly reminded all that applications for OKI's transportation capital funds are due June 6th.

Item #9 Other Business

There was no other business from the floor.

Short Range Planning (601)

Staff continued to help communities learn more about Transportation Alternative options and funding mechanisms and answered questions about the upcoming call for projects.

Statt attended field reviews for TA projects and reviewed the scope and set milestones.

Transportation Improvement Program (602)

Staff continued to monitor projects with OKI allocated federal funds.

A FY24-27 TIP Administrative Modification was presented and approved at the May ICC meeting. A draft TIP Administrative Modification and draft TIP Amendment was prepared for the June ICC and Board of Directors meeting.

Staff responded to questions regarding the 2025 Prioritization Process. Applications are due in June.


