Executive Committee Meeting Minutes

Ohio-Kentucky-Indiana Regional Council of Governments

Attendance record for OKI board members along with quests and staff follows the minutes.

#### Item #1A Administrative

First Vice President Bonnie Batchler called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. She reminded everyone to sign in, silence cell phones and to state your name/member name clearly when making a motion, second or comment. Trustee Tom Peck, Clermont County Township Association led the Pledge of Allegiance.

First Vice President Batchler requested a moment of silence to honor fallen Veteran and retired Hamilton County Sheriff's Officer, Deputy Larry Henderson.

#### Item #1B Approval of April 10, 2025, Board of Directors meeting minutes

First Vice President Batchler requested approval of the April 10 Board of Directors meeting minutes as distributed. Resident member, Mr. Karl Schultz provided a motion with a second from Council member Susan Vaughn, City of Hamilton; motion passed.

#### Item #1C CEO's Report

OKI CEO Mark Policinski shared at the June board of directors meeting, members will be voting on the agency's FY2026 budget and FHWA (Federal Highway Administration) will present findings of its certification of OKI.

Mr. Policinski provided an update of the Transportation bill. He noted current legislation ends in December 2026 and the reauthorization process is working its way through Congress. He said that NARC (National Association of Regional Councils) has been diligently making the case for MPO's (Metropolitan Planning Organizations) for when they get in front of respective committee members. He noted that OKI's legislative and communications manager, Julia Brossart will provide future transportation bill updates to the board.

Mr. Policinski closed by remarking on the incredible career of OKI board member Mr. Darryl Haley who is retiring from Metro at the end of May. He noted that Mr. Haley initiated and brought to fruition large-scale changes during his five years as CEO. Mr. Policinski noted that Mr. Haley is one of the most accomplished CEO's, whose great vision transformed Metro's operation to benefit its riders for years to come.

#### Item #1D Finance Officer's Report

Director Hannum stated copies of the Finance Officer's Report were distributed in advance with a printed copy at members' seats. She reported on the Council's financing activities, as of May 8, 2025, OKI had:

\$586,061 - PNC Bank Commercial Checking Account \$6,579 - PNC HSA/FSA Checking Account \$1,020,538 - STAR Ohio Money Market Mutual Fund Account

Director Hannum reported there has been no recent activity on OKI's line of credit, and that there is no outstanding balance at report date. She further reported on Balance Sheet, Revenue and Expense information.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion to approve the financial report. Resident member & Treasurer, Mr. Ken Reed provided a motion with a second from Trustee Tom Peck, Clermont County Township Association; motion passed.

#### Item #2 America's River Roots Festival

Ms. Susan Fisher, executive director shared general details about the festival which will be on both sides of the Ohio River in early October. She said there will be live music, riverboat cruises, food, and cultural events in celebration of America's 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

# <u>Item #3 Selection of Projects to be Funded with Section 5310 Federal Funds Allocated to the Cincinnati Urban Area</u>

OKI staff, Summer Jones shared the funding from the 5310-grant help serves the mobility needs of the elderly and disabled. She noted the members of the oversight committee were exemplary in how they worked together to try and figure out how to fund the most programs since the need is so great.

The oversight team scored and awarded 11 applications totaling a little over \$2 million.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI Resolution 2025-17. A motion was provided by Judge Executive Kris Knochelmann, Kenton County with a second from Vice Mayor Julie Smith-Morrow, City of Newport.

# <u>Item #4 Resolution Authorizing Retaining 4BIS.com as Managed Service Provider for Information Technology Infrastructure</u>

OKI staff, David Shuey shared that OKI utilizes a managed service provider to maintain and secure the computer network. The current provider, 4BIS.com's expertise and cost-effectiveness lead the agency to recommend them for FY2026. The resolution allows the CEO to execute a contract with 4BIS.com that does not exceed \$116,000.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI Resolution 2025-18. Trustee Shannon Hartkemeyer, Butler County Association of Township Trustees & Clerks provided a motion with a second from Council member Susan Vaughn, City of Hamilton; motion passed.

#### **Item #5 Non-Motorized Count Program**

OKI staff, Dr. Elizabeth Niese shared that OKI is a recipient of an ODOT award (\$124,000) to implement a bicycle/pedestrian counter program at 12 sites (sites TBD in Ohio). The resolution authorizes OKI's CEO to accept funding to purchase the count equipment and enter into an agreement with a consultant to install the equipment. The data collected will aid in planning efforts, safety analysis and bike/ped infrastructure investments. The data will be shared with ODOT and partners.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI Resolution 2025-19. Mayor Elizabeth Slamka, City of Middletown provided a motion with a second from Trustee Tom Peck, Clermont County Township Association; motion passed.

#### Item #6 Resolution Authorizing the Marketing Campaign for the Regional Clean Air Program

OKI staff, Jenny Newcomb stated that OKI is the eligible grant recipient for federal assistance in promoting the region's clean air program. The resolution authorizes the marketing/advertising expenditures for the FY2026 Clean Air Program. She shared the Clean Air Program is currently promoted with radio ads and during Cincinnati Reds games.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI 2025-20 which was provided by Trustee Jonathan Sams, Warren County Association of Township Trustees & Clerks with a second from Commissioner David Painter, Clermont County; motion carried.

#### Item #7 Resolution Authorizing the Marketing Campaign for the Regional RideShare Program

OKI staff, Jenny Newcomb shared that OKI's RideShare program serves as the local rideshare agency for OKI's eight-county region. The goal of the program is to reduce single occupant vehicles on the roadways. The purpose of the resolution is to authorize the marketing expenditures for the FY2026 RideShare campaign.

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion for OKI 2025-21. Commissioner Stephanie Summerow Dumas, Hamilton County provided a motion with a second from Mr. Darryl Haley, Metro; motion carried.

#### Item #8 - Intermodal Coordinating Committee Report

OKI staff, Mr. Andy Reser provided a brief update of the ICC meeting held on April 8, 2025. He shared the ICC committee heard a presentation of the Riverfront Commons project in northern Kentucky from OKI board member Will Weber, Southbank Partners. Mr. Weber shared that approximately 5 miles of the riverwalk is complete and future plans include 20 miles of trail from Ludlow to Silver Grove. OKI awarded approximately \$8.5 million for several phases of the project.

Mr. Reser also noted that the ICC committee approved a TIP Administrative Modification and recommended resolutions on 5310 federal funds program, OKI's Non-Motorized Count program, Regional Clean Air program and RideShare program. He lastly reminded all that applications for OKI's transportation capital funds are due June 6<sup>th</sup>.

There was no other business from the floor.

#### Item #10 Adjournment

First Vice President Batchler requested a motion to adjourn. Mr. Ken Reed, Treasurer provided a motion with a second from Mr. Darryl Haley, Metro; motion passed.

#### **FOOTNOTES TO THE FISCAL YEAR 2026 BUDGET**

#### Note 1 - Overall Operating Budget Cost Classification System (Section II, Page 3)

The Overall Operating Budget, Section II, has six major cost categories. Five categories deal with expenditures of the Council and the sixth deals with the valuation of assets or services contributed to the Council by outside organizations. Of these major cost categories, Item 3 (Travel, Subsistence, and Professional Development), Item 4 (Printing, Marketing, and Contractual), and Item 5 (Other Expenditures) are detailed by sub-cost categories for financial presentation. Established procedure of the Council is that cost overruns of the five major cost categories require a budget revision to be approved by the Budget and Executive Committees; individual sub-classification overruns will be explained in monthly financial reports. Overrun in the sixth major category, Contributed Services does not require a budget revision. Although such services appear as an expense, they are actually contributed services to the Council that have a positive impact on Council finances as long as project budgets can absorb the value of such services.

The Budget Committee of the Council will make the determination if and when budget revisions are appropriate.

#### Note 2 – Capitalization Procedures

Effective July 1, 2003, fixed assets of the Council are capitalized when the cost of an individual item exceeds \$5,000.00. Previous policy required capitalization when cost exceeded \$250.00 per item. It is the belief of management that this depreciation schedule along with reporting techniques surpasses the requirement of the *Government Accounting and Standards Board* (GASB) procedure, GASB 34.

#### Note 3- Capital Expenditure Authorization Budget (Section III, Page 5)

The following capital expenditures are budgeted for fiscal year 2026.

<u>Computer Hardware and Software.</u> The micro-computerization capital re-investment program for the Council will continue this fiscal year. The fiscal year 2026 capital budget includes \$10,000 for a HyperV Server Replacement. The supply budget includes \$30,805 for replacement computers and related hardware and software. The fiscal year 2026 software

subscription budget includes \$81,181 for Acrobat Pro DC, Google Cloud SQL, Microsoft Office 365, AI, Silktide, NearMap Online Imagery, GeoTab Altitude Platform & 2025 Vehicle Data, and other software services.

GIS, Transportation Modeling, and Simulation Systems. In fiscal year 2003, the Council began its GIS program with \$20,000 budgeted for Hardware. Since then, additional GIS hardware and software have been added to the system, along with Transportation Modeling and Simulation hardware and software for a more comprehensive system. The items in this category have been direct purchased with specific program funds. The fiscal year 2026 capital budget includes \$95,000 for twelve Citrix AI Evo units for the pilot bike/ped counter program. The fiscal year 2026 expense budget includes \$2,000 for hard drives for the model server rebuild.

Office Furniture and Equipment. The fiscal year 2026 budget does not include any additions in this category. The supply budget includes \$3,194 for hosted phone system equipment fees and other miscellaneous office equipment.

<u>Leasehold Improvements</u>. Nothing is budgeted in this category for fiscal year 2026.

<u>Financial Management Software</u>. The fiscal year 2026 software subscription budget includes \$11,362 for the annual financial management system software subscription fee.

Replacement Staff Vehicle. Nothing is programmed in the capital budget for fiscal year 2026. Currently the Council has a 2019 minivan in service.

#### Note 4 - Depreciation and Use Charges (Section II, Page 3)

Office furniture and fixtures are depreciated over a period of ten years with one-half year depreciation taken in the year of purchase and of disposal. Personal computers acquired prior to July 1, 1998 were depreciated over a 60-month life beginning with the month of purchase. Computers acquired after June 30, 1998 are depreciated over a life of three years. GIS hardware and software and reproduction/copier equipment will be depreciated over a 60-month life, each beginning the month that such items are placed in service.

Vehicles are depreciated over a period of 60 months. The estimated salvage value is deducted from the purchase price to arrive at an "adjusted basis" which is the depreciable amount. Depreciation begins in the month of purchase, with half-month convention used for fiscal years beginning after 1987. It is the belief of management that this depreciation schedule along with reporting techniques surpasses the requirement of the *Government Accounting and Standards Board* (GASB) procedure, GASB 34.

#### **Note 5 - Accounting System Information**

The Council is on an accrual basis of accounting. Unlike fund accounting systems that are on a modified accrual basis, the Council recognizes expenditures and revenues when incurred, and matches revenues to the appropriate period in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The Council uses non-budgetary types of accounts since fund accounting is not utilized, and relies on a sophisticated job-cost accounting system to control its financial programs.

The Council, under the direction of the Auditor of the State of Ohio, engages the service of an independent public accounting firm (CPA) to audit OKI's books, and the Council has received "unqualified" opinions on their financial statements since 1970.

#### Note 6 - Member County Contribution Information (Section V, Pages 11 & 12)

The member county contributions requested for fiscal year 2026 may be found in Section V, page 11 of the budget. In order to distribute costs in an equitable fashion between OKI member counties, July 2024 census population for the eight counties, three state areas is used for calculating allocation percentages for all activities. All allocations are based upon population unless otherwise noted. The computational table may be found on page 12 of the budget document. The County dues continue to be calculated on the approved rate of \$0.33 cents per capita in effect since FY 2000.

#### Note 7 – Salary Adjustments

Fiscal year 2026 budget includes 6% for merit salary adjustments to be awarded in conformity with the Council compensation program, as has been approved by the Board. Cost of living increases are **not** provided for in this budget document.

Beginning in fiscal year 2002, the budget provides for and authorizes only merit increases based upon the compensation plan adopted by the Executive Committee in late 2000. Such increases will be awarded solely on a basis of performance/merit. Approval of this budget document provides the specific authorization to award such merit increases in conformity with the approved program.

#### Note 8 – Office Lease

In May 2023, the Council executed a new 7-year lease with CBRE Corporation to provide for office occupancy at 720 E. Pete Rose Way through June 30, 2030. Per the terms of this lease arrangement, OKI's base rent for FY2026 will be \$188,816.28. During the lease term, the Base Rent shall increase 2.5% per lease year.
